As you may be aware, the church parking lot has been re-striped in recent weeks. We have also added two handicap parking spaces at the west end of the Education Building near the Lafayette Street entrance. Those spaces are marked with the handicap logo on the asphalt and with new vertical signage.

The parking spaces near the Picnic Shelter have been changed from diagonal to parallel. Two are next to the playground and three more are near the Monroe Street exit, parallel with the alley. There will be no parking next to the Picnic Shelter itself and the asphalt in that area is marked "No Parking".

In keeping with our familiar traffic patterns, vehicles will still enter the parking lot from Lafayette Street and exit onto Washington Street or onto Monroe Street, as they always have.

Please remember, the alley that runs next to the Picnic Shelter is city-owned and the traffic laws will be enforced if there is ever an accident due to a motorist(s) entering from the wrong direction. Please **do not enter** the parking lot from Monroe Street.

The old black and white "One Way" sign has been replaced with a three color "One Way -Do Not Enter" sign next to Monroe Street for safety purposes.

Finally, since we have had problems with people loitering inside the ramp area next to Monroe Street, the Board of Trustees approved the manufacturing and

installation of a metal security gate. The gate also meets the fire code, has a slap handle, and opens in one direction...OUTWARD. In an emergency, you can always get out, but you cannot get back in. When functions are taking place in the Fellowship Hall or adjacent rooms, the gate

will be propped open.

Current building keys will also open the gate once the new lock cylinder arrives. Thank you for your cooperation and I look forward to seeing you when we are allowed to be together again!!!
